## **Reading and Writing at Home**

Research is clear that students need direct instruction in skills and strategies for reading and writing and significant time to practice their reading and writing work in class and at home. To learn and grow as a reader and writer, students need to read and write often at their independent level, and with books and topics of choice. ELA teachers use an instructional model called Reading and Writing Workshop or Balanced Literacy to support the growth of skilled, independent, lifelong readers and writers. Students are engaged in reading and writing texts that are narrative, informational, and opinion throughout the year. The most important features of a reading and writing workshop classroom include time for explicit teaching, and time to do the independent reading and writing work with choice and feedback.

How can families help support growing readers and writers at home? Provide a regular time and place to read every night for 20-30 minutes. Talk to your child about their book choice and if it matches their interest and ability (students have been learning about making appropriate book choices with support from their teachers).

**Read aloud** to your children and encourage a love of reading and writing. **Ask your child...** 

- What are you reading now? Why did you choose it? Is it a good fit?
- What is your book about? What are you learning? Who are the characters?
- What do you plan to read next?
- What are you writing about in writing workshop? What are you working on as a writer?
- What did you learn during your mini-lesson today? What are you working on during independent reading or writing time?

Reach out to your child's ELA teacher for more information on how you can support your child's reading and writing growth this year.

#### **HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS**

- Keep an eye out for distracted pedestrians and drivers who may not be paying attention to you, especially when backing out of parking spaces. Shopping center parking lots are busier during the holidays.
- Buckle up every car ride, every time, whether it's the long trip to visit family or around the block to the mall.
- Turn off decorative lights before leaving home or going to sleep. Regularly check lights for exposed or frayed wires and loose connections.
- Keep candles and matches out of reach of small children. Lit candles should be at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn, and don't forget to blow them out when you leave the room or before you go to sleep. Store matches and lighters out of children's reach and sight.
- Never leave the kitchen while you're cooking and always use oven mitts or potholders to carry hot pots and pans.
- Remind everyone to wash hands A LOT. The last thing you want is a winter cold going around your house. Don't hug or kiss every visitor that walks in the door. Teach kids it's best to cough or sneeze into their elbow not their hands. Tissues are best but not always available.
- Continue getting at least 8 hours of sleep every night to prevent illness and stay healthy.
